SEWAGE INSPECTIONS

The Perth Health Unit this year inspected several properties on the lake, including the Burgess island in Parks' Bay. Both cottages there were found in breach of provincial regulations. Notice has been served on the owner to discontinue use of the sink drains and toilets.

Unfortunately, there are also other problem areas on the lake. Improper sewage systems are a "rip-off" for everyone else. If the cost of a toilet and a proper tile bed seems high, then a simple outhouse can be put up for much less. Some of us are using a privy and liking it just fine.

OFFICIAL PLAN FOR OTTY LAKE

On August 21 the official plan was adopted by the Tay Valley Planning Board and became part of the Tay Valley Plan. The draft was the subject of a number of discussions during June and July, when your president met the Township Councils, the Planning Board and representatives of the developers in order to bargain the issues. At the public hearing on August 12, some two dozen were present; the meeting was over in an hour.

The Plan confirms the 100' setback for sewage systems and now also provides a 50' (15 meters) setback for all new buildings. In principle, it discourages any disturbance of natural vegetation within 100' of the lake. The development freeze, which was to have lasted 1 year from April, 1977 was removed on August 21 with adoption of the Plan. Summaries of the Plan may be had by request from the Secretary.

PUBLIC LANDS AND PICNIC ISLANDS

Several of the islands in Otty Lake are Crown lands. This means that they are publicly owned, left in their natural state for all of us to enjoy. Unfortunately, a few selfish persons have been using more than their share.

The little picnic island in Area 1 - one of the Three Sisters - is not suitable for camping. There are no sewage facilities, and the island is too small to provide a supply of fuel for fires. Do those who hog it for entire weekends and cut down our trees realize that the rest of us get no pay for having to pick up the garbage after? Cloverleaf Island is much bigger and could accommodate overnight campers, as long as they "keep it clean".

Blueberry Island, near Cloverleaf, has also been the site of many happy picnics in years past. But lately it has been suffering from a heavy load of paint. Some call it decoration ...?

We join the Ministry of Natural Resources in urging residents and visitors to show respect for public lands - our lands.

WATER LEVELS

As many of you have mentioned to the executive, this year's water level has been higher than usual. Most of the summer it was about $1" - 1\frac{1}{2}"$ above the agreed level (as set July 1, 1973-75). This was due to the beaver dams at the lower end of Jebb's Creek.

The Rideau Valley Conservation Authority has agreed to destroy these beaver dams more frequently and to trap the beaver more intensely. We are therefore hoping to get the levels down before freeze-up, in order to reduce the amount of ice damage in the winter or flooding in April.
